PUBLIC DOMAIN CD (PD CD)

For newcomers, **Shareware** is defined as programs you can try out, and if you like them, pay the developer the shareware fee. Often features may be limited until you pay the fee and get the registration code. **Freeware** is defined as free programs, but retain copyright control by the developer. **Public domain** is defined as free programs that don't have copyright control.

If you are new to the group, I have researched and written the monthly PD CD column in the newsletter for many years. I also make the physical CD that you can purchase for \$5 at the back table at our monthly meetings. CD for this month will be at the December 2008 meeting as the November-December 2008 CD.

My columns are also on the club's Wiki. There are six programs this month.

1Password-2.9.4.dmg Password Manager program. Works with most web browsers, including Safari. Saves having to remember passwords. Can generate strong passwords for the sites you visit. OSX 10.4/10.5 PPC and Intel machines.

calcboard.zip Freeware widget "for everyday math" per the description. 67 constants included and you can have user-defined variables. Plenty of standard functions. Widgets are 10.4 or better as you may know. Now this widget handles complex numbers and tensors, so this everyday math is for whom?

christmas_super_frog.dmg Christmas themed Frogger game. Freeware OSX 10.4/10.5 PPC or Intel.

mac_pilot.dmg Access and tweak hidden settings in the operating system. 900 are claimed. Can run routine maintainance routines. OSX 10.4-10.5

MacGourmet-2.3.6.dmg Latest update to this recipe program. Update for Foodnetwork and Epicurious import. OSX 10.4/10.5

Mactracker_5.0.5.zip Latest update to this Apple Macintosh computer database program. Contains the most recent new Macs! This database also includes Apple mice and keyboards, displays, printers, scanners and cameras too!! OSX 10.3.9 to 10.5 PPC/Intel Freeware

Google Calendar CalDAV/iCal Syncing Now Official

Although the plumbing has been in place since the summer, it's always nice to have an official announcement, and now we do: Google has gone on the record with its support for CalDAV syncing from iCal to Google Calendar. You can now gracefully sync your editable Google calendars with your (Leopard-only) iCal, keeping a local copy of those events in the cloud.

Granted, both BusySync (which adds Bonjour-based iCal synchronization between Macs) and SpanningSync (which includes Address Book --> Google contact sync) have been handling this task with aplomb for some time, and they offer something Google hasn't -- a nice GUI for picking your sync options. That too has been addressed: Google Code is hosting the Calaboration sync setup tool, a basic checklist of calendars to add to your iCal setup.

Security Tips For Safe Online Shopping

At the November SBAMUG meeting, Vice-President Elect Bob Goodman gave an excellent presentation on holiday shopping on the Internet including some security advice. The following article by Rich Mogull of TidBITS (http://db.tidbits.com/) elaborates on security tips for shopping on the Internet during the holidays or anytime.

The annual American tradition of Black Friday shopping madness, with its irresistible deals and steep discounts for those willing to brave the crowds of the local shopping malls, has come and gone, but the rest of the mad shopping season is still going strong. These days, however, thanks to the wonder of the Internet, we can all experience the hustle and bustle of the mall from the comfort of our own homes. And to help keep your shopping experience authentic, there's no shortage of cheats and thieves ready to yank your painstakingly chosen gifts right out of the virtual trunk of your Web browser, along with your credit card number.

In the spirit of safe and happy holidays, TidBITS presents our top tips for safe online shopping. Some of these tips also apply to the real world for those of you who just can't resist the mall. (For your Windows-using friends and family I have a non-Mac version of this article available at my security blog).

Buy Safely With New Payment Options --

Consumers have a number of relatively new options to protect their credit cards and bank accounts when shopping online. I recommend you use a dedicated credit card, temporary credit card number, or PayPal account for holiday shopping.

The most basic option is to pick your credit card with the lowest limit and use it exclusively for holiday shopping. Choose one you can monitor online, and check the activity at least weekly through the holidays. Also make sure your chosen card isn't also a debit card, since debit cards don't have the same fraud protections as credit cards, and you may be responsible for fraudulent

charges. While you can always dispute a credit card charge, only some banks, on some accounts, allow you to dispute debit card charges (even if your card has a Visa or MasterCard logo on it).

To keep your card statement simple, turn off any automatic payments so you can dispute any spurious charges before making a payment. Keep tracking activity at least monthly after the holidays are over, and consider canceling the card if you notice any unusual charges that you can't account for, even if they are low dollar amounts (a technique bad guys use to test for valid cards and people who aren't paying attention). Save all email receipts for online purchases in a mail folder, since they're extremely helpful when trying to remember what you might have ordered for \$25.92 on November 30th.

I recommend you restrict your credit card use to major online retailers. For smaller shops instead use either a PayPal debit account or temporary credit card. While you might get a better deal from Billy-Bobs-Bait-Shop-And-Diamond-Wholesaler.com, many smaller retailers don't have security as strong as their bigger brethren. Those hosted or selling through a major service are usually safe, but few consumers really want to check the pedigree for specialty shops.

One approach is to create a dedicated PayPal account that's *not* linked to any of your bank accounts or credit cards. You can pre-fund it via bank transfer with as much cash as you think you need and use it for online payments where you're a bit dubious about the retailer. In the absolute worst case, you would lose only what's in that account, and you can easily cancel it anytime.

Another option, depending on your credit card company, is a temporary credit card number for online shopping. These are disposable card numbers you generate yourself using your card issuer's Web site, and they can't be used again or leveraged to run up your account. Charges still appear on the same bill, and are tied to your main credit card account. Check with your credit card company to see if they offer this service, but most of the major card issuers do. I like temporary credit card numbers better than account passwords (such as Verified by Visa and Mastercard

Those older columns are here, too, as they have been since 2001. This new series is written with the same spirit and sense of community of my original series."

You'll find articles on organization, selection, launching and the Internet and there is a link for those of you who may still be using System 9. To follow the columns, you use the Chronological Index or find article by topic within the menus.


