SBAMUG IN SEARCH OF A NEW MEETING SPACE

CAN YOU HELP US FIND ONE?

If you did not attend the June 25 meeting or have not visited our website or wiki recently, perhaps this is the first time you heard that after eight years, the Knob Hill Center will no longer be available for our monthly meetings, although we are scheduled there for the next few meetings as far as we know.

As vice president Jim Pernal recently e-mailed the group, "In a nutshell, the Knob Hill center is part of the City of Redondo Beach, but they lease the community center from the Redondo Beach School District. The School District has opened the property up to new lease, and the City will no longer be leasing the Knob Hill center from the School District. All exact details are not known yet. We likely will have until December of this year at the Knob Hill center, but we could possibly be forced out earlier. The bottom line is that we need to start to look for an alternate meeting location. For more details go to our wiki page on this subject or click on the "HELP! Some members have posted possible locations on the wiki discussion link, and Terri Slaven compiled all the e-mail messages containing suggestions and posted them as well. As we explore options, it's important to remind possible managers of potential locations that we are an educational 501(C)3 non-profit organization.

The following is a list of the needs and wants for our new

meeting room space, compiled by President L.J. Palmer, if you begin investigating possible places.

- Be able to schedule one night per month for a 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. meeting. (Last Wednesday of the month preferred.)
- Room for at least 120 people.
- High speed Internet availability. (We prefer to provide wifi for our members during the meeting.)
- Adequate and safe parking.
- Prefer a one story building. If not, elevators needed.
- Prefer to stay near our current location in South Redondo Beach, but not a requirement.
- Fees not exceeding \$200 per month rental including use of wifi.
- Prefer no or low deposit setup fees and deposits without extra fees for liability insurance.
- Use of the location's chairs, tables, podium etc.
- Storage for projector screen a plus.
- PA system availability a plus. (If not supplied, would there be issues with other users in the building if we used one?)

A personal view from Bob Toast 9

Toast from Roxio, <u>roxio.com</u>, is the ultimate disk burning program and one of my favorite applications. If your needs are basic, the CD/DVD burning capabilities built into OS X and iLife applications may be all you need. But, if you want to go further you need a good disk burning program

ther you need a good disk burning program and Toast is the king. There's not much it can't do.

Toast is easy to use.

- 1. Pick the task you want to do from the five categories (see right), Data, Music, Video, Copy and Convert
- 2. Choose a subcategory or type of project.
- 3. Add files and folders by dragging and dropping from the Finder or use Toast's media browser that gives you access to all your files

and iLife libraries. The media browser gives a realtime preview of most files — music, photos, videos and DVDs.

4. Set recorder options and start burning.

Toast 9 now burns DivX, Blu-ray and HD-DVD discs, although you'll need an external drive for the latter two formats since Macs don't yet include HD (high definition) drives. Toast exports in a hugh variety of formats and can import all of the standard QuickTime formats, plus many more. Toast can copy unprotected CDs and DVDs and if the original is damaged, it will do it's best to recover the files. It can span large amounts of data over several discs without splitting files. A feature I really like is that I can copy an entire 8.5 GB dual layer, unprotected DVD to a standard 4.7 GB disc. Toast compresses the video and uses all available disc space while maximizing video quality. If you take a lot

of short videos, Toast now has batch support that lets you merge multiple videos onto a single DVD disc.

Toast comes with 5 additional programs (see right). A couple of these can make your



purchase well worthwhile.

- CD Spin Doctor is a basic, but capable audio recorder. It helps you set up your equipment, record from vinyl records or cassettes, filter out noise, split tracks, add song information and one-click burn to CD/DVD. It doesn't save in the MP3 format so you'll need to use iTunes. New is streaming audio capture from almost any source, such as Internet radio. I used it briefly, but found it doesn't compete with Audio Hijack Pro.
- Disc Cover creates attractive labels, jewel case covers and inserts from a huge collection of templates and clip art. It prints to paper labels or direct to disc as well as LightScribe and Labelflash etching with a compatible printer.
- DiscCatalogMaker creates searchable catalogs of CD/DVD contents. This is a favorite as I archive many old files on CD/DVD. After a while I have no idea where my files are stored, but the program has a fast and flexible search capability that can find, show and open a file.
- Get Backup is a handy backup program. You can selectively back up, and optionally compress, your files and folders in a full or incremental mode.
- Streamer streams TiVo and EyeTV recordings from your Mac at home over the Internet or to a WiFiconnected iPhone, iPod Touch, Mac, or PC.

TiVoToGo lets you automatically schedule shows recorded on your TiVo to transfer to your computer. Trim and remove unwanted segments from TiVo and EyeTV recordings.

Toast comes with a 144 page users guide (PDF). Because there is so much to the program I find it a bit sparse in some areas. The extra programs have their own help files. Roxio's web site has a searchable knowledgebase and an on-line discussion forum that can be very useful.

The basic burning capabilities of Toast 9, honed over the years, are mostly unchanged from Toast 8, but there are many new and advanced features. Sadly, I was not able to check them out — support for Blu-ray and HD recorders, TiVo, EyeTV, Slingbox or one of the new AVCHD (Advanced Video Codec High Definition) camcorders.

Summary: Toast is essential if your needs go beyond the basic burning provided by OS X. If you already have Toast 8, it may be sufficient unless you need the advanced capabilities of Toast 9.

PUBLIC DOMAIN CD (PD CD)

In case you didn't know, I research and write the PD CD column in the newsletter each month and have for many years. I also make the physical CD that you can purchase at the back table at our monthly meetings. The CD's cost \$5 each (except the archive CD that costs \$20).

Published every other month, these discs contain the shareware, freeware, and public domain (PD) programs reviewed monthly in the club's newsletter. If you are new to these terms, **Shareware** is defined as programs you can try out, and if you like them, pay the developer the shareware fee. Often features may be limited until you pay the fee and get the registration code. **Freeware** is defined as free programs, but retain copyright control by the developer. **Public domain** is defined as free programs that don't have copyright control.

My columns are also on the club's new wiki. Go to the main page and click on PD CD. You can read the articles in the notebooks to determine the system requirements for each program. Generally OS X is required for the past several years.

This month I'm featuring eight with a two aimed toward book collectors.

1Password-2.6.2.dmg This password manager program has been well reviewed. It integrates into most browsers (Safari, Firefox, etc). It can generate strong passwords. It can be used with iPhone and Palm Pilot. It adds to the power of Safari's autofill and the OSX keychain. OSX 10.4 - 10.5

Books_3.1.9.tbz Freeware personal library management. You can enter in all sorts of book details as well as search and sort. It can support barcode scans. OSX 10.5

Golfcard.dmg If you are a golfer, this is a scorecard keeper and analysis tool. It keeps track of scores and courses, weather, putts, fairway hits and so on. OSX 10.2 - 10.5

GrandPerspective-0_9_12.dmg This is an pdate of a useful utility I have reviewed in the past. This shows your hard drive or other storage in a graphical way. Individual files are color coded into rectangles. The larger the file size, the larger the graphic. This is a great way to quickly locate the large files that are taking up space on your drive. Freeware. OSX 10.3 to 10.5

librarian_pro.dmg This is the second book inventory type program this month. Can be used with other media such as CD's and DVD's. It uses Amazon lookup to help fill in the information. OSX 10.4 to 10.5

WebSnapper.dmg This is a Safari plug-in that lets you capture the entire webpage exactly. Save as a file, PDF file or to the clipboard. OSX 10.4-10.5 PPC and Intel.

whatsopen_v10.dmg Here's another freeware utility program. This will let you see all the open programs on your Mac and you can then filter the results. It's good for finding the open programs on removable media. OSX 10.5 only

YummySoup!.dmg This shareware is a recipe organizer. You can organize and share recipes (including pictures), and create shopping lists. You can import from the Internet, but this is an updated version that I have reviewed this program before. OSX 10.4-10.5

The CD for this month will be at the August 2008 meeting as the July-August 2008 CD.

If You Haven't Tried iBank 3, Check It Out in a Free Trial

I'll admit it: I have never had a personal budget. Since childhood, I have had the uncanny ability to spend less than I bring home. But, with gas prices rising so fast, I wondered, "Just how do I spend my money?"

iBank 3 (release date May 12, 2008) is a personal finance manager made just for Leopard. From the second I opened iBank 3, I got that warm and fuzzy feeling that this was designed as a Mac application and not just an afterthought of a PC application.

Setting up my accounts was very easy and fast. iBank 3 comes with an 18 page quick start guide as well as a 341 page nicely laid out reference manual. I had the option of iBank directly downloading my account transactions. My bank charges a fee for this service, however, so I chose instead to connect to my bank's website and download files.

With my checking and credit card accounts set up, I created a spending chart. The chart easily captured my credit card transactions, but the checking account transactions were nowhere to be found. I searched the user forums and manual for help, but could not find an answer. I sent an e-mail to the support team who responded immediately and asked for specific information from me. I provided it to them and after several e-mails back and forth, I still do not have a solution.

iBank 3 has many other features that I did not test, including sync transactions with iPhone; check stocks from any web browser, iPhone or iPod Touch and export tax data to tax software. The fact that I can't make a simple chart has left me disappointed. Perhaps this new release has many bugs in it that will be resolved soon with updates. I am not ready to abandon this software yet as

I think it has such a nice user interface and their support is very responsive.

As to the free ones, Apple has really been putting out first rate videos lately. It appears that they have been making a concerted effort to reach Mac users in video form as well as their robust text driven help. They even offer their quick tips as podcasts. Apple also offers

some guided tours linked to in the Dig Deeper section at the bottom.

In making this list for you, I've stayed with tutorials for Mac Basics plus many of the essential applications that come with your new Mac. I've tried to pick ones that are current with Leopard, but there are some Tiger ones included that would also work in Leopard.

I've skipped the older and out of date ones. Believe it or not, there are some that go back to System 7. Also, there are additional tutorials out there that cover other applications, but this list is focused on a solid Mac foundation.


