How to Follow Along With Real-Time Lyrics in Apple Music on Mac from OS X Daily

Listening to music has always been a great thing to do, but during this stressful time, perhaps it's more important than ever. It's a welcome break from the 24/7 news cycle and is an inexpensive and enjoyable escape. If you're listening to new songs or revisiting some of your old favorites, it helps if you can follow along with the lyrics in real time. Now you can do this on your iPad and iPhone, and on your Mac with Apple Music. Enjoy a karaoke session on your Mac!

Lyrics aren't available for all songs, but they're available on most pop songs, so hopefully the songs you like have them baked in. Listening to music while singing along (or just trying to memorize the words) is an easy thing to do when you're using a Mac. You'll need to be using MacOS Catalina 10.15.4 or later to be able to enjoy the new real-time lyrics.

How to Use Real-Time Lyrics on Apple Music for Mac

1. Open the Music app and start playing your favorite song.

New iPhone SE Review by Arnold Silver

When Apple introduced its newest iPhone SE in 2020, I was intrigued by the fact that it was still the same size as my iPhone 7. but internally it was really souped up, had a better display, and retained the home button and fingerprint sensing instead of face recognition. My iPhone 7 was pretty close to being obsolete; in a year or two it would no longer be able to be updated to the latest operating system. I was thinking about getting a new phone, but I really did not like the idea of the phones getting bigger because it is more difficult to fit in my pocket. I don't use the phone for much more than making phone calls, navigation, using Apple Pay, paying at Starbucks, etc.


With all the stores shut down, my only option to obtain a new phone would be to order it online which is an option I didn't really like. I still like to be able to talk to somebody and actually hold a device in my hand before I make a final purchase, so I was sitting around waiting for an opportunity to be able to go into some store and pick up a phone. I usually buy my phones at the AT&T store near me. That AT&T store opened a week earlier. I tried to contact them on the phone to see if I could get the phone at curbside pickup but that didn't work. So I planned to brave the virus and visit the store in person. In preparation, I backed my iPhone 7 up to my iMac at home.

I was the only customer in the store with three clerks. We were all wearing masks. I purchased the 128 GB phone to replace my iPhone 7. I was surprised that the sales rep didn't need to open the box to set the SIM card. When I was ready to leave with my phone still in an unopened box, I said that now I needed to upload all my data from my computer. Her recommendation was to use phone-to-phone transfer. I asked if I needed a special cable? She said, No, it's wireless. Just position them close together.

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How to use Real-Time Lyrics In Apple Music from page 1

- 2. With the song playing, click the "Lyrics" button in the top-right corner of the screen.
- 3. If the song has lyrics, you'll see them scroll by as the song plays.
- 4. Click any line to jump to that verse.



5. Click "Window" and then "Full Screen Player" to see the lyrics in full screen mode. Perfect for karaoke sessions!

Quick Tips for Desktop and App Management

Hide a Window - To quickly hide a window on the desktop, just press Command + H. The app will disappear into the background, but you can get it back by clicking on the icon on the dock or using Command + Tab.

Hide All Windows - You can hide all the windows except for the window for the app you're currently using by pressing Option + Command + H.


Cycle Between App Windows - If you have multiple windows open for an app like Safari, you can swap between those open windows using Command + the Tilde (~) key.

Switch Between Multiple Desktops - If you use multiple desktops, you can swap between them quickly by pressing the Control button and then either the left or the right arrow.

The procedure was very simple. Placing the opened two phones next to each, I was immediately prompted to upload the old phone. Just needed my Apple ID and password. Train SIRI and fingerprint sensing. One complication—there was an iOS update at the same time that I couldn't avoid. Neverthe-less, it was the most painless I ever experienced. I still had to un-sync and re-sync my watch, which took much longer than transferring the phone data. I still have to reload my Apple wallet and a few special items, but most functions work immediately.



What Are Relocated Items in macOS Catalina? Should Delete them? From OS X Daily

If you update to MacOS 10.15 Catalina or later, you may see a new "folder" on your desktop titled "Relocated Items". This folder is part of the MacOS upgrade process. During the system update, your Mac checks files and data to ensure everything is in its correct location, isn't damaged in any way, and that it's valid and authorized and any file that doesn't meet these criteria are put into the Relocated Items folder. This is not really a folder but a shortcut (or alias) to a folder at "/Users/ Shared/Relocated Items", so you can remove the folder from the desktop, because the original files are actually stored in /Users/Shared/Relocated Items/ It's probably best to leave these files where they are but if you want to delete them, check them all to see if they are files you want or need to keep.

Consider These Factors Before Buying A New iPhone from Business Insider

- Processor and RAM: The processor and RAM are the two most important parts of any phone. They determine how smoothly it runs and works through intense tasks like gaming or multitasking. The newer your iPhone, the better the processing power and RAM.
- Storage space: Storage is very important because the more storage you have, the more photos, songs, videos, and apps you can have downloaded on your phone. The minimum amount you will want is at least 32GB; and the newest iPhones start with 64GB and go up from there.
- Screen size: iPhones have a variety of screen sizes. Smaller phones are easier to hold but not as easy to read for extended periods.
- Battery life: Most iPhones don't have great battery life; smaller phones have less battery capacity.
- Ports: All iPhones have a lightning port for charging, but many don't have the 3.5mm headphone jack. Consider buying wireless headphones.
- Software: Apple provides updates to its iPhones for about four years after their release, so you can have your iPhone up to date for four years before you should buy a new one. Always update your software for security and new features.
- Price: An iPhone is a good investment it's your camera, computer, photo album,
 music player, and gaming console. A
 good iPhone can remain useful and upto-date for about four years.
- How to buy: Consider monthly payments vs paying in full. Buy from retail store like Best Buy, from phone service provider, or from Apple.
 Remember Apple has its upgrade program so you can get a new iPhone every year, with 12 monthly payments on current phone.

Zip Disks and Drives

Since I am confined to my home 24/7 these days, I was trying to clean up my office. I found a box with about two dozen Zip disks that I didn't know I had. I had no idea what was on any of them. Since they were about 25 years old and I can no longer read them, I was going to just toss them. Since they might have private data, I decided to destroy the floppy disks that contained the data.

Do you remember the Zip disk? The Zip disk was a removable floppy disk storage that was introduced by lomega in late 1994. It required a special drive, the "Zip drive" sold by Iomega, that plugged into the computer USB port. Considered medium-to-high-capacity at the time of its release, Zip disks were originally launched with capacities of 100 MB, then 250 MB. It was significant at that time to transfer and/or back-up data. The format became the most popular of the super-floppy products that filled a niche in the late 1990's portable storage market. However, it was never popular enough to replace the 31/2-inch floppy disks. The final versions of the Zip disk reached 750 MB. Zip drives fell out of favor during the early 2000's.

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Zoom Promises End-to-End Encryption for All Users from WIRED

Initially Zoom said it would only offer end-toend encryption (E2EE) for video and audio calls only to its clients who pay for Zoom services, but now it has changed course and will offer this service to all customers.

Zoom said the encryption service will be opt-in for its customers because its E2EE will not work with all conferencing equipment or with customers calling form regular phones.

To enable the encryption service, those using Zoom for free will have to give their phone number or some identifying data so the company can verify who they are. Paid clients do this when they sign up for the service.

When two or more devices communicate over the internet, E2EE allows data to move back and forth between them in a form that is indecipherable to anyone other than the participants. This protects the data from potential eavesdroppers like governments, internet service providers, or communication platforms themselves.

Digitize Your Vinyl Records, Tapes and CDs

Do you have cassette tapes, CDs, or vinyl records? With some patience, software, and equipment that connects to the computer's USB ports, you can digitize this information. In addition to making files that play on your smartphone or media server, digitizing this information allows you to store your audio online for safekeeping. The steps for converting your old recordings vary on the formats and equipment you have, but here's a general outline of the process and the equipment you may need.

Get audio-editing software

No matter what sources you're converting, you need software to digitize it. Transferring the audio to the computer has been done for years, and there are free programs to do this including Apple's GarageBand for Mac and open-source Audacity (for Windows, Mac and Linux), with its own instructions for converting records and tapes. Commercial software is also available. Choose a digital format for recording and follow the software's instructions to import audio. After you transfer the whole album, you can use the software program to divide the recording into individual tracks, label the songs, and eliminate or reduce any unwanted noises.

Digitize vinyl

If you don't have stereo equipment but still have records, you have a few choices. You

can use a compact USB-based "conversion" turntable that connects directly to the computer. It's the easiest process to convert the vinyl. For those with less technical know-how, there are some commercial options. If you own a turntable with a headphone jack or a port labeled "line" (or a stereo receiver with a "phono" input for the record player), a device called a USB phono preamplifier links your hardware together with audio and USB cables to pump the sound into the computer for recording. For USB-based recording using older turntable systems without the headphone jack or line output, you'll need to include a separate phono preamplifier box to boost the audio signal as well. Check online for options.

Digitize audiotape

If you don't have a tape player, you can find some online with USB connections. These devices can be good for digitizing old lectures, family history and other recordings. If you still have a tape deck, check its jacks. A cable with a 3.5-millimeter plug on both ends or an RCA-to-3.5mm cable are common for connecting to a computer's line-in port (if it has one), or you may be able to use a USB interface box like those used for digitizing vinyl.

Convert CDs

If you have CDs to transfer but no CD player or disk drive on your computer or laptop, you can purchase an external USB-based CD player online. Connect it up, put in the CD, and import the tracks with Apple's Music app for Mac, Microsoft's Windows Media Player or another free CD-ripper app.

Outsource the job

If you prefer to have an audio conversion service digitize your old media, that's good, too. Be aware that they charge fees for this.

Check Out the Internet Archive!

The Internet Archive (archive.org), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, is building a digital library of Internet sites and other cultural artifacts in digital form. Like a paper library, they provide free access to researchers, historians, scholars, the print disabled, and the general public. Their mission, to provide Universal access to all knowledge, began in 1996 by archiving the Internet itself, a medium that was just beginning to grow in use. Like newspapers, the content published on the web was ephemeral - but unlike newspapers, no one was saving it. Today they have 20+ years of web history accessible through the Wayback Machine and they work with 625+ library and other partners through their Archive-It program to identify important web pages. As their web archive grew, so did their commitment to providing digital versions of other published works. Today their archive contains:

- 200,000 <u>software programs</u> (click this link for old Apple software and games!)
- 330 billion web pages
- 20 million books and texts
- 4.5 million <u>audio recordings</u> (including 180,000 <u>live concerts</u>)
- 4 million <u>videos</u> (including 1.6 million <u>Television News programs</u>)
- 3 million images
