Foldable Smartphones

Foldable phones are here, just not yet for the iPhone. The first commercial smartphone with a foldable display was Royole Corp's FlexPai in 2018. Samsung has the Galaxy Stretch and Huawei the Mate Xs on the market.



Soon afterward, Samsung and Huawei, the world's two largest smartphone makers, began offering their own foldable models. Samsung officially announced its Galaxy Fold in February 2019; it features dual foldable displays that can be bent with a radius of curvature as small as 1mm, allowing the phone to fold up with the display on the inside. Huawei announced its first foldable smartphone, the Mate X, later that month. The Mate X is about 11mm thick when folded, and its display (like that of the FlexPai) is on the outside, meaning that the bending radius of the display is roughly 5mm. And this year, each company introduced new foldable models.



A recent article in the November 2020 issue of the IEEE Spectrum describes efforts to develop reliable, high performance displays that not only bend, but also stretch.

I have to believe that Apple is planning its entry in the foldable phone market soon. Apple keeps its plans secret as much as possible, but some clues are gleaned from Apple patents that are in the public domain. A recent article in Tom's Guide discusses a possible future flip iPhone. Personal Information & Data

You may wish to remove personal information and data from devices prior to recycling. This would include data on hard drives, cell phones (especially smart phones), network equipment such as firewalls, routers and switches, USB Travel Drives, and Printers. Below are methods for wiping data before recycling:

Hard Drives: Minimum 3 Pass Overwrite of the entire drive using a data security program.

Cell Phones: Delete phone numbers in contacts lists, erase pictures, videos, and other multimedia, delete your text messages from the inbox, sent and draft folders, as well as your recent call lists. For Smart Phones most models have a reset option, this will effectively remove all personal information and data. Instructions for accessing this option are usually included in the smart phones manuals, or on the manufactures websites.

Network Equipment: Most network equipment has a factory reset button on them or an option within their configuration menus to reset the device to the original factory settings. It is highly recommended that you reset the equipment to the original factory settings to remove any personal information or data that may be stored in the unit.

USB Travel Drives: Delete all files on the travel drive. Additionally, overwriting the unit is also recommended. Many data security programs designed for hard drives can also overwrite this type of media.

Printers: Some printers contain hard drives that retain the records of documents that are

printed, scanned or faxed from the units. Additionally most all-in-one printers will retain information such as fax logs that contain records of faxes and the phone numbers they were sent to. It is highly recommended that prior to turning off the unit, you delete the logs from your printer. This can usually be done through the printer menu and instructions for this are available in most user manuals or from the manufacturer's website. It is also recommend that after unplugging the printer from the network or computer that you power the unit on and then back off again. This will usually clear the printer's memory. Of special note on printers, check the printer paper trays, some people will reuse paper that already has printing on one side. Data and personal information may be contained on paper that is reused in this manner. Remove any paper that may have data on it from the printer trays.

Ring Security Cameras Adding End-to-End Encryption

A year after the Electronic Frontier Foundation called on Amazon to enable end-to-end encryption on Ring video doorbells, [Amazon has begun rolling out the feature](#). End-to-end encryption ensures that Amazon employees cannot see what's been recorded from your doorbell, and more importantly, should guarantee that Amazon cannot hand over that footage to law enforcement without you being served with a warrant. However, to take advantage of end-to-end encryption, you must [enable it manually](#).

Ring has been the center of multiple privacy controversies, such as failing to encrypt Wi-Fi passwords (see "[Amazon's Ring Doorbells Sent Wi-Fi Passwords in the Clear](#)," 21 November 2019) and recruiting police departments to do marketing ("[Amazon Using Police Departments to Sell Ring Cameras](#)," 29 July 2019). We'd like to see Ring make end-to-end encryption the default to prove that it's not just tossing a bone to privacy advocates while still profiting from those who are unaware of the implications or are intimidated by the setup steps.
